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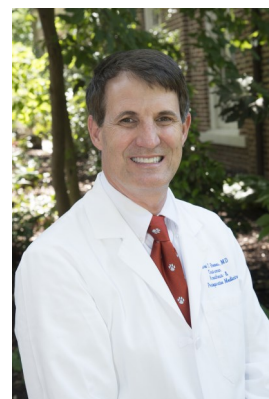
## MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN: OPENING OF MUSC SIMULATION CENTER BY CATHERINE TOBIN, MD

I have exciting news to share! Our MUSC Healthcare Simulation Center (HCS) has moved into its new location on the 2nd floor of the Colbert Library in the horseshoe. The entire building was renovated including the library, campus-wide student study spaces, and the College of Medicine lounge. The 2nd floor is shared with the Center for Clinical Evaluation Teaching and Simulation (CCET) for College of Medicine. Standardized patients for Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE's) take place here.

Our center is used by the entire campus including students, residents, and hospital staff. The Colleges of Nursing, Medicine, Health Professions, and Pharmacy all utilize our HSC. Examples of some hospital courses we have hosted are Central Line Insertion, ACLS, Moderate Sedation, Ultrasound IV Insertion, LVAD Simulation, and Orientation for Patient Care Technicians.

The operating room at our simulation center has a functioning Drager anesthesia machine, video laryngoscopy, fiberoptic scopes, and code cart with working Zoll defibrillator.

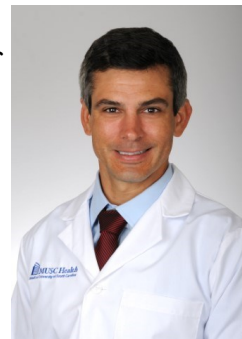

**S.C. DHHS TEACHING HOSPITAL PHYSICIAN SURVEY - PLEASE COMPLETE BY 2/15**

January 19, 2023

**Your Response is Needed**

Dear Physician,

As part of the State Medicaid Program MUSC Health, including MUSC Community Physicians, are now required to complete the S.C. Department of Health and Human Services' Teaching Hospital Physician Survey by February 15, 2023.

The state has changed the program to a 'directed' payment program this year. They included a 10% withholding on our payments from the MCOs. Return of the withholding amount is contingent on having 100% of our physicians complete the survey.

Inclusion in the program is based on receiving payment on a claim from Medicaid FFS or a Medicaid MCO in the prior calendar year (CY22).

You have been identified as a physician for whom a claim was filed with one of the MCOs and will need to complete this survey: <https://survey.scdhhs.gov/index.php/749823?lang=en>.

Please complete this survey as soon as possible. We must achieve full participation in this survey for MUSC to be eligible to receive all allowable Medicaid Payments from the state at the end of the fiscal year.

Concerning questions within the survey that include "FTE years", consider yourself as one (1) FTE and count each year of practice as one (1) year.

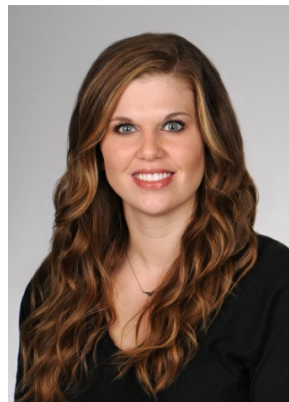

## AMERICAN ACADEMY OF MEDICAL COLLEGES MID-CAREER WOMEN FACULTY LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT SEMINAR; KATIE BRIDGES, MD

Dr. Katie Bridges was recently nominated for and attended the American Academy of Medical Colleges Mid-Career Women Faculty Leadership Development Seminar in Indian Wells, CA. This was a unique and highly educational conference whose attendees included physicians at the associate professor level spanning all medical specialties as well as basic science faculty engaged in research at academic medical centers. The conference included speakers from across the country with a variety of disciplines - physician leaders, attorneys, executive coaches, and individuals with corporate experience. The conference included numerous small group discussions and workshops on topics ranging from career transitions to academic funding challenges. There was a particularly engaging workshop in which all attendees completed a personality assessment and split into groups depending on personality "color." It was fascinating to see how most anesthesiologists in attendance fell into one of two personality types and how we use our personality strengths in daily practice. Not surprisingly, our personality types differed from most of our surgical colleagues as well as most primary care specialties. The discussions regarding personality evolution were very eye opening, ending with a recommendation for repeated personality testing at various stages of life. Is your personality type the same today as it was during college? Unlikely. Will it be the same in a decade? Probably not. Do you know how to interact effectively with individuals who don't share your personality type? Food for thought.

Ultimately, this conference allowed for female academic leaders to convene and learn from one another. It was interesting to see how many of the challenges faced in the research world are shared by those in clinical medicine. I appreciate the nomination and support of our department and the MUSC College of Medicine and am grateful for the opportunity to attend.

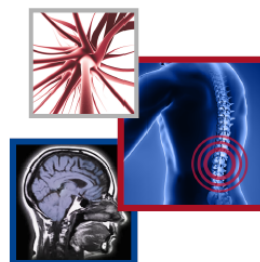

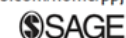

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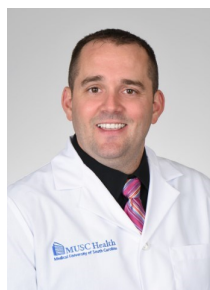
